

Skill Focus: Public Speaking


With Berkeley coming up, this is a good time for juniors to start developing your professional public speaking skills. It is extremely important that researchers learn how to convey the significance of what they are working on; what steps they are taking methodologically; why disciplinary examination is important; and how their project fits in to the big picture of our collective, essential needs. Begin by finding a suitable text (like maybe your PUF application or your URC presentation) and reading each page aloud. Pay attention to words that are difficult to pronounce and mark those words on the practice text. Then read text again, this time standing up and facing where an audience would be - not the mirror. Having completed these two steps, are you convinced that you sound well-versed? The typical answer is "no" because you are used to doing what you do, not saying what you do. Once you have practiced so much that it feels fluid and smooth, then start practicing in front of classmates, roommates and other prospective audience members to test your material for clarity to the general audience and have a separate test for disciplinary norms and accuracy for the specialist audience. You will generally need to have different presentation styles given the anticipated knowledge base of the audience members. When in doubt, employ your general audience presentation style. Make eye contact to engage your listeners. Clasp your hands together and inhale slowly through your nose if you get nervous or feel short of breath. And remember – you've got nothing to be afraid of!
